2023 SACAD ANNUAL LUNCHEON HELD IN ORLANDO, FLORIDA

The 2023 SACAD Annual Membership Luncheon was held in conjunction with the SACSCOC Annual Meeting and was well received by more than 100 attendees. The event was held on Sunday, December 3, 2023 in Orlando Florida. The session was entitled: "Higher Education Inflection Point: Leveraging Al for Efficiency and Innovation." The presentation was described as follows: In a rapidly changing landscape, institutions of higher education are under constant and immense pressure. This session offered a holistic view of the current challenges, cultural barriers to innovation, and the urgent need for higher education transformation. Engineering, specifically on the Evolvability of Aspect Oriented Software.

Dr. Chris Howes serves as the Vice President and Chief Information Officer of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System. Dr. Howes joined KCTCS in 2021 and provides leadership, service, and strategic technology direction for the system. An



experienced technology leader, his career includes working with technology startups, healthcare organizations, and serving in technology leadership roles at the University of Kentucky. Most recently, he served as Chief Information Officer at Morehead State University.

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ALABAMA

Dr. Aaron Milner Named President of Coastal Alabama Community College



Dr. Aaron Milner

The Alabama Community College System Board of Trustees recently approved the appointment of Dr. Aaron Milner as President of Coastal Alabama Community College (CACC). Dr. Milner previously served as Superintendent of Saraland City Schools.

Dr. Milner began his career in education as a middle school teacher in Eufaula City Schools, and within six years, he started his tenure in leadership as an

assistant principal at Enterprise High School. He was Superintendent of Enterprise City Schools from 2010 to 2013, when he began his tenure as Superintendent of Saraland City Schools. In addition to his experience in K-12, he has served as an adjunct professor for both master's and doctoral courses in educational leadership at the University of South Alabama and for various courses in educational leadership at Troy University.

Nominated as District 1 Superintendent of the Year in both 2016 and 2018 and recently named President Elect of the School Superintendents of Alabama, Dr. Milner's service to education across Alabama spans across executive committees for both K-12 administrators and government entities.

Milner is an alum of the University of Alabama, where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Education. He earned a Master of Science from Troy State University and a Doctor of Education from Auburn University. His dissertation focused on the level of knowledge Alabama's high school principals had in regard to the disciplinary mandates of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Enrollment increases at Alabama's community and technical colleges surpassing national average

Spring registrations for classes throughout the Alabama Community College System are higher than they were this time last year, building on the momentum from increased fall semester enrollment and marking the third consecutive year for enrollment increases statewide.

Fall semester enrollment in for-credit academic and technical programs rose more than 6 percent from 78,524 students in 2022 to 83,509 in 2023. This year's fall enrollment is the highest the system experienced since Fall 2017, when for-credit enrollment was 81,139.

For-credit college enrollment defines enrollment in courses

that are applied toward earning an associate degree or bachelor's degree. About 40 percent of current ACCS students are earning credit to transfer to a four-year institution, while the largest number of career technical students are pursuing credentials in registered nursing, computer and information sciences, business administration and management, or manufacturing engineering technology. Dual enrollment, which allows high school students to earn college credit at little to no cost, has increased nearly 17 percent from Fall 2022 to Fall 2023. Dual enrollment has increased more than 159 percent since the 2014-15 school year.

The current enrollment growth represents the third consecutive year of for-credit enrollment increases across the Alabama Community College System, bucking national trends for community colleges. According to the National Student Clearinghouse, community colleges nationally grew by about 4 percent in the fall term.

Registrations in noncredit workforce-connected programs offered through the Alabama Community College System are also on the rise. More than 27,700 residents are currently participating in training programs that yield industryrecognized credentials within weeks, contributing to Alabama's workforce development. Programs such as Adult Education's Alabama Career Essentials (ACE), Mobilizing Alabama's Pathways (MAPS), and the Innovation Center's Skills for Success rapid training classes are playing a pivotal role in upskilling the workforce.

Spring registration at Alabama's community and technical colleges is already showing a remarkable increase of more than 17 percent compared to the same period last year.

Dr. Tashika Griffith Selected for the Aspen Institute's Rising Fellowship



The Aspen Institute College Excellence Program (Aspen) recently announced that Dr. Tashika Griffith, Provost of the Clearwater Campus at St. Petersburg College (SPC), is one of 40 leaders selected for the 2024–25 Aspen Rising Presidents Fellowship. Applying lessons from over a dozen years of researching exceptional community colleges, the Aspen fellowship aims to select and prepare the next generation of presidents who can lead institutions

Dr. Tashika Griffith presidents who can lead institution to higher and more equitable levels of student success.

Many sitting community college presidents plan to retire in the next decade, creating an opportunity for college trustees and system heads to select leaders with the skills and

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knowledge to achieve better student outcomes. Aspen Presidential Fellows represent the next generation of college leadership: this incoming class of Aspen Rising Presidents Fellows is 58% women, and 55% are people of color. The institutions they represent are also diverse, located in 20 states, from small rural colleges to large urban campuses.

The fellows, selected through a competitive process, will work closely with highly accomplished community college presidents and thought leaders over 10 months to learn from field-leading research, examine demographic and labor market conditions in their communities, assess student outcomes at their colleges, and advance a clear vision for excellent and equitable outcomes for students while in college and after they graduate.

Rising Presidents Fellows aspire to enter a college presidency within five years of completing the fellowship. As fellows, they join a network of over 350 forward-thinking peers, 175 of whom are sitting college presidents, who are applying concrete, grounded, and innovative strategies to meet student success challenges in their colleges.

Dr. Ryan Foley Named President of Savannah Technical College

offering students valuable skills and career opportunities. To support eligible students participating in the program, the Gulf Research Program has awarded NLTCC the Workforce Development for the Energy Transition grant.

In November of 2023, NLTCC also received a grant from the Lumina Foundation's "Tell Your Story" project, which will be used for the design and creation of a school mascot and rural campus signage, which will foster a stronger sense of community and identity.

NLTCC's commitment to community partnerships under Dr. Spillers' leadership is evident in new collaborations between the Automotive Technology program and the Shreveport Fire and Police departments. The partnership aims to increase the pool of qualified automotive technicians within the city departments. Students in the last six months of their training will have the opportunity to work in these city automotive shops that serve the Fire and Police Departments.

In addition to these accomplishments, NLTCC underwent various physical transformations in 2023, with renovations still ongoing at the Shreveport campus. The LPN program has expanded to now include an Associate Degree in Practical Nursing, and the Mansfield campus is one step closer to expanding its nursing wing.

In Fall 2023, NLTCC introduced the Industrial Maintenance Technology Program at both the Mansfield and Shreveport Campuses. This addition of new programs aligns with the college's commitment to providing diverse educational opportunities that meet industry needs.

Another significant milestone for NLTCC was the successful visit from the Council on Occupational Education (COE), paving the way for reaccreditation. NLTCC also achieved reaccreditation with ATMAE for the Industrial Instrumentation & Electrical Technology programs. ATMAE accreditation plays an important role in ensuring the high quality and industry relevance of NLTCC's programs, which provide the college with recognized credentials that enhance students' career prospects.

To further support its journey, NLTCC has now established a 501(c)(3) charitable foundation to support students' workforce endeavors and other college initiatives.

The Aspen Rising Presidents Fellowship seeks to prepare the next generation of college presidents to lead institutions towards higher levels of student success and equity. Fellows will engage in a ten-month program, collaborating with accomplished community college presidents and thought leaders, to develop innovative strategies for advancing student outcomes and fostering excellence and equity in higher education.

Empowering Women in STEM

In celebration of Women's History Month, the Pearl River Community College STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) Club for the Poplarville Campus hosted a Women in STEM Symposium on Thursday, March 28. Dr. Verba Moore, a retired Colonel from the United States Air Force, was the special guest speaker tackling the focus of Innovate, Demonstrate, Elevate & Advance Women in STEM.

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Moore shared her unique experience, from the decision to pursue a medical degree to her shift into implementing electronic health records for NASA. In her class at Tulane University with 157 graduates, she was one of four African Americans and one of 48 women. Her choice to become a flight surgeon in the United States Air Force catapulted her into a career where she was often a trailblazer.

EMCC Awarded U.S. Department of Labor Grant to Boost Training in Select Advanced Manufacturing Programs of Study

The U.S. Department of Labor has awarded East Mississippi Community College (EMCC) a \$1.56 million grant that will bolster efforts at The Communiversity to meet employer demands for skilled workers in industrial and engineering technology sectors while increasing enrollment and retention of female and minority students in advanced manufacturing programs of study.

EMCC is among 16 colleges in 14 states collectively awarded \$55 million in the latest round of Strengthening Community Colleges Training Grants through the Department of Labor's Employment and Training Administration. Grantees will work with industry stakeholders to identify workforce needs in selected industries within the colleges' labor markets. EMCC was the only college in Mississippi awarded one of the grants.

EMCC applied for the grant to meet an anticipated uptick in demand for workers with advanced technical skills at the \$2.5 billion Aluminum Dynamics plant under construction in Lowndes County. Slated to open in the summer of 2025, plans are to eventually hire up to 750 employees for the mill that that is a joint venture with Steel Dynamics, Inc., a metal manufacturing company with eight locations, including one in Lowndes County.

Aluminum Dynamics and Steel Dynamics are two of the industry partners in the grant program, as are PACCAR Engine Company and Yokohama Tire Company. The project title is the EMCC Advanced Manufacturing Sector Initiative, or EAMS.

The grant funds will be used to enhance enrollment efforts and provide support to EMCC's Mechatronics Technology, Industrial Maintenance and Systems Based Automations programs at The Communiversity, where training in advanced manufacturing fields of study takes place.

EMCC serves a six-county region that includes the counties of Oktibbeha, Clay, Lowndes, Lauderdale, Noxubee and Kemper. Student demographic data reveals an equity gap in the enrollment, retention and eventual graduation and employment of black/African American and female students in the college's industrial and engineering technology career pathways programs.

This is the fourth round of Strengthening Community Colleges Training Grants, which has to date provided funds

to 170 colleges in multiple sectors, including advanced manufacturing, health care, IT and infrastructure projects such as construction, transportation, broadband expansion and renewable energy. In addition to the \$55 million awarded in the latest grant disbursement, a selected number of the grant recipients will participate in an evaluation study and share an additional \$10 million in funding. That group of recipients will be announced in the fall.

ECCC Partners with Mississippi Power to Enhance Campus

East Central Community College President Dr. Brent Gregory recently accepted a Deeply Rooted, Future Focused capital campaign contribution from Chris Phillips, the District General Manager for Mississippi Power, in a partnership to promote science, technology, engineering, and mathematics at the community college level.

With both organizations, ECCC and Mississippi Power, having served the residents of Mississippi for almost 100 years, the college looks forward to building upon the foundation of past leaders to benefit future generations with the help of donations and partnerships such as this.

Dr. Bill Fiege Named President at Brightpoint **Community College**

Before joining Brightpoint, Dr. Fiege held positions at Germanna Community College and Longwood University, serving in a variety of roles including division dean, speech communication faculty member, assistant director of alumni relations, and assistant director of athletics.

Dr. Fiege completed his bachelor's degree in political science at Longwood University; master's degree in speech communication from Bloomsburg University; and Ph.D. in community college leadership through Old Dominion University.

Virginia's Community Colleges Fuel State's Economy

According to a new study, Virginia's community Colleges generated \$11.6 billion annually in economic activity around the state in FY 2021-22, an amount equal to nearly two percent (1.8%) of Virginia's total gross state product.

The study, conducted by Lightcast and titled **The Econom**ic Value of the Virginia Community College System, concluded that VCCS alumni and the businesses they work for saw \$10.6 billion in added income. For perspective, Virginia would have to host the Super Bowl thirty times to achieve a similar economic boost. VCCS generates an additional \$1 billion in income through operational spending and attracting new students into the state.

Dr. Doré, Virginia's Community Colleges Chancellor, noted the study estimates that for every \$1 invested in the community college system, students gain \$5.70 in higher future earnings, and taxpayers see a net benefit of \$2.70 in added tax revenue stemming from students' higher lifetime earnings and increased output by businesses and public sector savings.

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When compared to a person with a high school diploma or equivalent, the average community college graduate with an associate degree will see an increase in earnings of \$12,200 annually. Separate from the Lightcast report, research by the VCCS reveals that students who complete FastForward short-term workforce training programs and go on to earn the resulting industry recognized credentials see average wage gains of \$11,746 per year.

"This study makes it clear that the Virginia Community College System is an economic engine in its own right, "said State Board for Community Colleges Chair Peggy Layne. "The myriad of positive contributions to state coffers and Virginians in particular cannot be understated."

Long term Return on Investment for the commonwealth:

In Fiscal Year 2021-22, the period which was the basis for the Lightcast report, state and local government funding for Virginia's Community Colleges totaled \$605.5 million.

The total investment made by VCCS students in FY 2021-22 amounted to a present value of \$1.1 billion, equal to \$433.8 million in out-of-pocket expenses (including future principal and interest on student loans) and \$632.8 million in forgone time and money.

Over the long term, for every dollar invested in the VCCS, the people of Virginia will receive a cumulative value of \$8.80 in benefits. Altogether, the social benefits of VCCS equal a present value of \$18.7 billion. These benefits include \$12.6 billion in added student income over a 40-year working career, \$4.7 billion in added business income, \$1.1 billion in added income from college activities, as well as \$319.7 million in savings related to reduced government spending for health, the justice system, and income assistance in Virginia, thanks to a more educated workforce.

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
